Merit Badge College - Council Event



Registration is now open for the Merit Badge College which is held at Lyman Hall High School in Wallingford, CT. Each Scoutmaster should have received a copy of the information for registering Scouts. The letter has the link for registering the Scouts. The dates are February 2, 9, 23 and March 2, 2019. The snow day, if needed, is March 9, 2019. The Scouts are expected to attend all sessions. If you do not have the information to register Scouts, please let Chet Wickett

know ASAP. Currently, we are not able to place this registration information on the Council Website. The CYC website is dysfunctional. It is pretty to look at but pretty poor for providing useful and needed information. So hopefully soon, a Powahay website will have the information available.

Eagle Scout Boards - Special Request

We are asking each troop to provide the Eagle Scout candidates Scouting history. We would like to see positions held, merit badges earned, special awards, outing history, etc. Some troops do provide this information sourced from Troopmaster or similar programs. This information is very helpful to the board members. We are surprised when a Scout does not remember positions held and they do not remember the number of merit badges earned. The sash may not have all the



badges "glued" on and since the sash is not considered part of the uniform, many do not wear it. As to the position of responsibility held, so often, the position patch on the uniform is not current or missing. We may see the former position patch when they are currently holding a new position. A questions that are usually asked when we do not see a position patch: What is your position? Where is your position patch? Did your troop give you a patch when you took on your position of responsibility?

Finally, as a follow-up to the good discussion on the Order of the Arrow, if a Scout is not current on their OA dues, they should not be wearing the OA patch or sash. Also, when a Scout enters as his position of responsibility "Order of the Arrow Troop Representative", this always generates questions like "what did you do in that position?" "Briefly describe the responsibilities of the position?" We find that most do not attend OA meetings or get involved with any OA activities or involved in

the OA troop elections. Yes, the Scout filled this position and usually for six months (should be 12 for this position) but the board can find that he did not fulfill this requirement. So what is an OA Troop Representative? What are his responsibilities? The Order of the Arrow Troop Representative is a youth serving his troop as the primary liaison to the troop's lodge or chapter. He meets the unit's needs by providing a communication and programmatic link to and from all Arrowmen, Scouts who are not presently member of the Order, and adult leaders. These efforts are meant to assist the unit and its members in achieving the mission of the Boy Scouts of America, and at the same time fulfilling the lodge's role in the Strategic Plan of the Order of the Arrow of being an integral part of the council. By setting a good example, he will enhance the image of the Order as a service arm to his unit. There are specific responsibilities of the representative that should be fulfilled. For example, he is expected to attend OA chapter meetings and bring this information back to the troop. Please know that this is not a light duty position and definitely not a no show or do nothing position. This is expected to be a busy 12 month position that reports to the SPL.



BSA First Eagle Scout

(A reprint from Scouting Magazine)

There's a story that takes place in 1912. It tells about the founder of Scouting Lord Baden Powell visiting the United States in January 1912. When he stepped off the ship in New York harbor, he was greeted by 40 uniform Boy Scouts.

Baden-Powell stopped to greet each boy, asking each his name and rank. But Baden-Powell's face "lit up", when he stopped at the last boy in line and noticed the youngster's large, gold-colored first-class pin and the many badges on his sleeve. Baden-Powell grabbed the boy's hand and asked about his merit badges. The boy, a modest fellow who rarely spoke about his accomplishments, turned red with embarrassment as the founder of the Boy Scout movement continued to address him while the official adult welcoming committee could only stand and wait.

Whatever Baden-Powell said must have inspired the tall 16-year-old. Because seven months later that young man became our nation's first Eagle Scout.

Arthur Rose Eldred Boy Scouts first Eagle Scout was born in New York in 1895. His father soon died, and Arthur was raised by his mother in Oceanside, on Long Island. Arthur's scoutmaster was actually his older brother, Hubert, who started Boy Scout Troop 1 in November 1910. The meetings were held in the family's barn. Each boy earned the money for his uniform, which made Troop 1 one of the first to be completely uniformed. Which was why they were among those chosen for the honor guard that greeted Baden-Powell.

Like today's Eagle Scouts, Arthur earned 21 merit badges. Since then, more than two million scouts have followed Arthur Eldred and earned their Eagle. A Wall Street Journal column expressed it beautifully: "What they have in common is that they chose a life of achievement and assumed leadership roles at a very early age."

Crew 353 Darien —Teens practice their STEM skills through interactive program

Venture Unit members and Scouts are working on group projects.

Last summer, 16-year-old Daniel Martorella spent several hours teaching children how to program robots.

Daniel gave the children a worksheet with a list of codes. The codes activate simple commands that the robots can perform, such as turning around.

Daniel was volunteering with STEM Venture Unit 353, an educational program for high school boys and girls that's run through the Boy Scouts of America. High school graduates can remain in the program in the role of adviser and mentor until their 21st birthday.

The program, which was established in Darien in 2016, has a special focus on STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) development and education.

"Our venture unit is totally and completely dedicated to promoting STEM research and curriculum development of our high school students," said Patrick Gentile of Darien, Venture Crew adviser. "The express purpose of our mission is for them to be able to teach and mentor young people within Fairfield County that live in lower income communities."

Over the last two-and-one-half years, STEM Venture teams have provided mentoring and counseling to over 300 at-risk children, Gentile said.

"The whole concept of what we do at the inner-city level is to help children develop their own voice through learning social and emotional skills, and being able to work together in groups," he added.

STEM Venture members will help

any community organization "that has a desire for us to teach," Gentile said. Currently, there are 15 teens enrolled in the program.

The Venture Unit has worked to write a curriculum of over 100 experiments and activities.

"We provide a full curriculum of science experiments, robotics, and computer coding," Gentile said. Members meet both in person and virtually. They practice giving the lesson they intend to teach and share ideas with each other online through video conferencing, according to Gentile.

Over the summer, the Venture teens volunteered with the Norwalk Community College Horizons program. It's free for children in grades 1 to 5 from low-income families who are having difficulty with reading and math development skills.

The best part of the Venture program, according to Daniel, is teaching the younger children new skills.

"It's a feeling when you are helping out the younger kids that you probably wouldn't otherwise have," said Daniel, adding that he is also a Boy Scout.

Another activity Venture teens participated in was a science advancement program called **Webelos College**. It was for fourth and fifth grade Cub Scouts and held in November at Scofield Magnet Middle School in Stamford.

Venture teens led a hands-on lesson on the dissection of owl pellets. "Our high school students taught close to 80 children within a four-hour period," Gentile said.

"Children identified what the owl ate by looking at its bones," said Venture member Julia Pfrommer, 16, adding that she designed the dissection lesson herself. "We had one owl that ate a bird. We had a couple of shrews, a mole, and rodents (that were eaten by owls)," said Julia, a Darien resident. Julia said she especially liked being able to answer the children's' questions.

"I had a kid ask me 'How do they collect the owl pellets?" Julia said. "I don't know the answer to that. I learned that it's a state secret, and is something that I want to learn."

Venture members help over 500 Cub Scouts each year through several town wide STEM events.

The STEM Venture program provides many life skills to teens, including leadership, according to Gentile.

"It creates a youth empowerment cycle by providing an opportunity for older students to teach younger students, and in turn the younger students then teach new students, so it's a continuous cycle," Gentile said.

"We try to make it as flexible and as fun as we can so they have the time to devote to it," said Gentile, adding many Stem Venture Unit members are also in the general Boy Scout program.

The Andrew Shaw Memorial Trust provides annual financial support for the STEM Venture Unit. The program is also supported by the Connecticut Yankee Council and the Darien Foundation, which funds projects that promote and enhance opportunities for Darien's youth.


